

Independent Assessor Requirements

- Any child or youth referred for a qualified residential treatment program (QRTP) must have an independent assessment by a qualified individual
- A qualified individual is:
 - A trained professional or licensed clinician
 - Not an employee of the Title IV-E agency or connected to/affiliated with any placement setting
- Qualified Individuals are contracted directly with an Administrative Service Organization (ASO) and overseen by CDHS's Office of Behavioral Health





Independent Assessments

A full psychosocial assessment:

- Face to Face with child
- Meets with family
- Connects with collateral informants: schools, GALs, religious leaders, case workers, current/previous providers, DYS
- Reviews documentation: hospital discharges, DYS assessments, school assessments, etc.
- Attends Family and Permanency Meeting
- Uses the Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) tool to help identify goals, guide decisions making
- The Assessor must specify why the needs of the child cannot be met by the family of the child or in a foster family home or any other level of care
- The lack of availability of a lower level of care is not a justification for QRTP services



Independent Assessments

An **Assessment Summary** will be created at the end of the assessment and given to the referring party:

- Clinical recommendations, Level of care recommendations, Time spent in a QRTP to date, History of services, If consensus was achieved during Family and Permanency meeting (consensus is not required), Major findings from the Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths (CANS) tool, Short and long-term clinical goals
- There is no appeal to an Independent Assessment, the recommendations are provided to the court who weighs the recommendation with all other information provided to make a decision on QRTP services



Independent Assessment Process



County identifies a child/youth as potentially needing QRTPlevel care

Use countyspecific criteria/review process



County makes a referral to the appropriate ASO with supporting documentation

Documentation includes prior assessments and collateral contact information



ASO initiates the Independent Assessment

Conduct face-toface visit with child/youth, contact with collaterals, document review



ASO completes the Independent Assessment

Input all gathered information into the CANS assessment tool



Family and Permanency Team Meeting held

Review assessment results and recommendations; work towards



IA report and family decision on QRTP is finalized

Information is shared with the county and included in the court report



Court Review

Approves or disapproves QRTP level of care




Implementation Timeline

- Currently in 2 counties need to get to all 64 by October!
- Rulemaking timeline:
 - o June Finalize IA rule recommendations
 - o July SubPAC/PAC
 - o August 1st read state board
 - o September 2nd read state board
